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Introduction

The British Library collect artists' books and fine press publications from the UK. Our collections also include many important works from the Americas and Europe.

Artists' books show great variety, innovation and experimentation. Our collections focus on the use of text and narrative, but also include visual arts and collaborative works between artists and poets. Creative collaborations and dialogues in artists' books can be found across our collections of fine press publications, which focus particular attention to art and craftsmanship in book production.

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Recent Acquisitions





Three books illustrate three distant styles of artists' book which are acquired by Contemporary British & Irish Published Collections.

Alejandro Acín, *The Rest is History*, a photobook which captures moments on, 31st January 2020 the day the UK left the European Union.

Andrew Mocket, The Chapbook of English Tat, a series of playful woodcuts capturing ornamental objects.

David Armes, *Here Others* offers an insight into English society's suspicion and scepticism to the other. The phrase set in **wood block emerges page-by-page** and is followed by a text that interrogates such attitudes.

Speaking to the Existing Collection



Down the Rabbit Hole, Tara Bryan, Walking Bird Press, [2016] RF.2019.a.126

This tunnel book, with the leaves have die-cut with a square holes in their centre, positioned at different angles and diminishing in size giving the impression of false perspective. Extracts from Alice in Wonderland is printed on the leaves. The work cleverly incorporates handling instructions which echo the narrative in and playful yet functional way. The structure of the work offers a physical interpretation of the classic story. Illustrating how the materiality of an artist's book can be in dialogue with the narrative.



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Responding to Contemporary Issues



Carolyn Trant, *Map of Lost Cuckoos*, Parvenu Press, 2019

Trant's *Map of Lost Cuckoo's* created form woodblock and printing on **recycled cardboard and newspaper**. The work is in a **'cartonera' style** cleverly allows a dialogue between the newsprint and the woodcut to re-emphases the **decline of native species** due to **climate change**.

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Fine Press Works from established and New Artists




Susan Allix Sea Air, Susan Allix, Aritsts' Books, 2018, HS.74/2374

Sea Air is an exemplar of a dialogue in an artist's book between well-known poems on the themes of the sea and air interplaying with a wide range of printing techniques, typographies and design giving fresh and exciting interpretation to the poems while offering an insight to how the artists' book can elevate well known poetry.

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Raising Awareness



Lucy Guenot ¿ Quo Vadis? Posted/Unposted British Isles, 2020.


This ephemeral pamphlet is part of Posted/Unposted project, where 28 artists, poets, printers and publishers employed letterpress printing techniques. ¿ Quo Vadis ? or 'Where are you going? 'explores the experiences of migrants form North Africa crossing the Mediterranean. The number1,327 printed on the **folded paper boat** represents the number of people who lost their lives crossing the Mediterranean in 2020.

In dialogue with Myth

Shirley Jones *The Quest*, Red Hen Press, 2016, shelfmark: RF.2015.b.75.

The Quest contains five of the most sumptuous coloured mezzotint plates augmented with gold. The story is drawn from the **middle Welsh epic** Culhwch and Olwen. It explores a stimulating and imaginative narrative of Gwrhyr's search for Mabon, the son of Modron, which picks at the threads of folk tales which extend back to some of the very earliest oral and folk traditions.

This work emphasises the connection between the rich narratives within library collections and how a contemporary artists' books bringing them to new audiences.



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The Democratic Multiple



Various Democratic Multiples by Tom Sowden.

A selection of Sowden's democratic multiples, which are based on a philosophy and practice of creating affordable, widely distributed art editions of artists' books that challenge the exclusivity of traditional art markets. The term emphasises accessibility, egalitarianism, and the democratisation of art ownership. Along with mimicking and riffing off and early exponents of the form such as Edward Ruscha.

Discovery

Given the very personal and idiosyncratic nature of artists' books, description in a way that aids discovery can be challenging.

Subject headings might be difficult to define and find.

A book may have one or **multiple contributors** and may incorporate fragments of text from multiple sources.

The process of description is often aided by the presence of **descriptive information** (such as a **portfolio or prospectus** supplied by the artist.) In many cases, these are retained in the Collection as they provide additional context for the reader.

Where an artists' book is identified as such at the point of acquisition, a subject heading of 'Artists' books' is added to the catalogue record to aid discovery.

Following some additional research the reader may also be able to search for an artist or press that they are interested in.

A subject guide on artists' books, and blog posts to publicise new acquisitions and events, are used to help support awareness.
